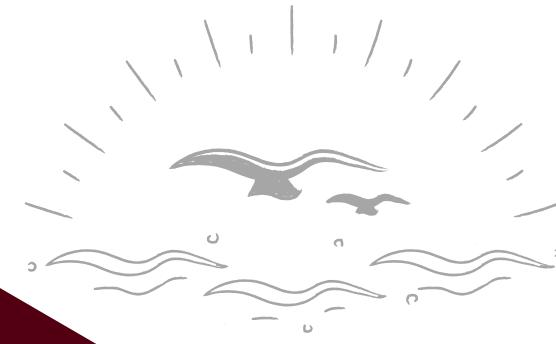

Know When to Get Help Risk Factors

Mild Risk

- Trouble adjusting to new situations
- Changes in academic performance
- Changes in appearance to include weight loss, hygiene change, illness
- Changes in their interactions with others

Moderate Risk

- Escalation of mild risk factors
- Social isolation
- Emotional outbursts
- Higher levels of irritability
- Conduct interferes with school or group activities

Elevated Risk

- Feelings of hopelessness
- Irrational speech or social media posts
- Suspicious, irrational behaviors
- Loss of contact with reality
- Narrowing of goals to ultimatums
- Signs of physical violence to self or others
- Disclosure of thoughts of death or suicide

CONTENT SUPPORT

Academic Success Course (ASCC) focus on building academic skills and support for students by strengthening core skills and teaching effective strategies to improve success in college-level courses. Students are selected into ASCC based on the Texas Success Initiative (TSI).

Course Support provides peer learning consultants who guide learning while working through difficult course concepts & example problems in 1-On-1 or Small Group sessions.

Guided Group Study provides large groups with interactive study sessions to reinforce course content in a fun, relaxed environment. These sessions provide the opportunity to meet other students in your class and form your own study group.

FIRST YEAR EXPERIENCE

First Year Experience (FYEX) proactively supports students' transition into college through coordinated academic, social, and support initiatives.

Hullabaloo U (HU) is a required, small, community-based course with a peer mentor to create a personalized environment to promote student success during the first semester.

ACADEMIC COACHING

Early Alert Program proactively identifies students who may be at-risk academically and connects them with timely support interventions. Through faculty referrals and progress monitoring, the program provides targeted outreach, coaching, and resource navigation to address challenges early and help students stay on track toward academic success.

General Academic Coaching provides student-centered support to develop effective academic strategies to achieve their goals. Professional and peer coaching supports students in time management, study strategies, goal setting, and self-regulation while connecting to campus resources.

Pathways Program provides structured support for students during academic challenges. The program includes a weekly course, individualized coaching, skill-building, peer coaching, and progress monitoring to strengthen core academic behaviors, increase campus engagement, and promote persistence toward degree completion.

FIRST GENERATION PROGRAMS

FIRST Gen Program supports first-generation students' transition to and through the university by providing community and engagement to improve academic success.

Regents' Scholars & Texas Leadership Scholars supports students from Texas through scholarships, academic support, and enrichment to promote success, leadership and degree completion.

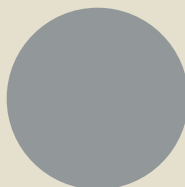

HOW DO I QUALIFY FOR HONORS?

INCOMING FRESHMEN (one of the following):

- Graduated in top 10% of high school class
- SAT composite score of 1300 (minimum 620 for Math and 660 for Reading/Writing)
- ACT composite score of 28 (minimum 27 each on verbal and math)

INCOMING TRANSFER STUDENTS: earned a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.50 from prior institution

CURRENT TAMUG STUDENTS: earned a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.50 at Texas A&M University

PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS

Honors students must complete 18 hours of Honors credit (including three required Honors Seminars) maintain a 3.5 cumulative GPA, attend 2 Honors meetings per semester, and complete 10 volunteer hours per semester.

THE HONORS CURRICULUM

The Honors curriculum aims to help you expand your knowledge and experience both in and outside the classroom.

Through **Honors Contracts**, you work with your instructor in a course you're already taking to design a way to increase the depth of your knowledge in that topic. These contracts allow you to connect with faculty and staff on a more personal level than you would normally.

Through **Honors Seminars**, you get to apply real-world occurrences to the topics you're learning:

- The **Connections** (GALV 101) seminar is designed to teach students how to think in an interdisciplinary manner. This is accomplished through various topics that blend humanistic and scientific inquiry. This seminar is meant to be taken in your first year in the program.
- The **Service Learning** (GALV 401) seminar exposes you to the theory, practice, and benefits of community service. You'll be surprised to learn all the ways you can help others!
- The **Writing Methods** (UGST 405-200) seminar allows you the opportunity to learn different ways that disciplines acquire, record, and present information.

Through **Honors Courses** you'll be able to work with a smaller cadre of classmates to give you a deeper, richer experience and a closer relationship with the professor.



Academic Opportunities in DIVE

Minor in Dive Technology and Methods (DVTM)

TAMUG's minor in Dive Technology and Methods is one of only a few of its kind in the world. Courses in the minor allow students to develop skills and earn certifications in:

- **Basic and advanced diving skills**
- **Scientific and research diving**
- **Divemaster**
- **Problem management, rescue, and first aid**
- **Boat diving, drift diving, wreck diving**
- **Underwater photography and full-facemask diving**
- **Technical diving**
- **Cavern diving**
- **Underwater survey and mapping**
- **Expedition planning**

TRAINING TOMORROW'S UNDERWATER INNOVATORS.

The TAMUG Dive Program has a long history of producing graduates that become leaders in the scientific and recreational diving industry.

Scientists and engineers need a varied tool kit, and diving is important if you are interested in becoming a marine biologist, marine scientist, oceanographer, maritime archaeologist, and even those interested in ocean engineering. Scientists and engineers dive to collect information or specimens that are then returned to the laboratory for additional study. Underwater survey techniques are of particular interest to nautical archeologists and oceanographers.



DIVE Program Resources

- **180,000 gallon campus pool** that is available for group and individual diving and fitness training
- **Two on-campus dive lockers** providing in-house access and service of diving equipment used in teaching and research
- **Research and teaching vessel** (R/V Trident) available for offshore diving opportunities
- Public school costs with private school environment: **maximum 12 to 1 student/faculty ratio** in labs
- Active **extracurricular diving club** to maximize in-water opportunities
- **Training locations** in international and local openwater locations, including California, Mexico, Florida, and Roatan
- **Industry leading instructors** with expertise in underwater forensics, marine biology, maritime archaeology, offshore diving, cave and cavern diving, technical diving, underwater photography, and more!

Career Opportunities in Diving

- Biologists or mariculturists at aquariums and zoos
- Diving researchers for academic institutions in marine biology, marine sciences, maritime archaeology, and more
- Instructors and divemasters for the tourism, cruise ship, and resort industry
- Entrepreneurs: manage your own dive company
- Research assistants at state and federal agencies such as NOAA, EPA, USGS, Army Corps of Engineers, and TPWD
- Dive Safety Officers and Assistant Dive Safety officers at educational institutions, aquariums, and private organizations
- Technicians at environmental consulting firms (e.g., aquatic environmental impact assessments)



Dive Minor:

To enroll in the dive minor, you need to meet in person with the Dive Program Academic Coordinator, Jesse Pintacuda to complete the Minor Form (provided at the meeting).

Dive Minor Appointments:

Dive Minor appointments can be scheduled after you have enrolled in or completed a “DIVE_XXX” course at TAMUG. The in-person appointments take approximately 20 minutes and will cover the course flow, pre-requisites, swim test requirements, equipment needs, etc. of each course. You will then fill out the form based on the course offerings and submit it to your academic advisor. The form typically needs to be completed by add/drop day (5th day of classes) of the semester that you are taking a course.

Appointments will resume in August, and timeslots will be posted by August 3rd. The link to schedule an appointment is: <https://calendly.com/jpintacuda/>. There is currently no availability posted.

General Information:

If you are not a certified scuba diver, you would enroll in DIVE 250. This course is offered every Fall & Spring semester and includes Open Water (license to dive) and Nitrox Certifications.

If you are already certified, please contact Jesse via email with your current certifications, comfort level in the water, last time that you went diving, and approximate number of dives so we can determine the best course for you to take.

If you have any questions, please email Jesse and she will typically respond within 48 hours.

Frequently Asked Questions

What kind of certifications does TAMUG offer?

We offer a wide range of dive training and certification courses for divers pursuing basic, advanced, or specialized recreational certifications, or for those interested in pursuing professional careers in scientific, technical, or recreational diving. (See back for our training progression). Our primary certifying agencies are TDI/SDI/ERDI, DAN, and AAUS.

Why should I take dive classes here instead of at a dive shop?

Generally, an open water class taken at a scuba shop is completed in two weekends, and often most of the instruction is conducted via e-learning. We conduct our classes over 14 weeks, with in-water sessions and lecture sessions EVERY week, which vastly increases student comfort and competence. Additionally, our courses can be credited toward a minor in Diving Technology and Methods!

What do I need to buy to participate?

At the entry level, students are only required to buy a mask, snorkel, fins, and booties. In later classes, students may be required to buy wetsuits and accessories such as underwater slates, surface marker buoys, whistles, compasses. We also welcome students who have or wish to buy their full complement of diving equipment, but access to all life support equipment (tanks, regulators, BCDs, etc) and most accessories are included in course fees.

What are my employment options in or after DIVE?

There are two opportunities for student employment WITHIN the program: we employ student Divemasters to support the safety mission of the DIVE program, and Dive Locker workers, who support equipment service and maintenance. Many of our grads go on to conduct diving research in graduate school, but others are employed with NASA, NOAA, the Corps of Engineers, Texas and Louisiana Parks and Wildlife, Moody Gardens, the Pacific Whale Conservancy, SeaWorld, and more!

How do I pay for the classes, and what are the costs involved?

Courses through the TAMUG dive program do cost more than equivalent courses at a scuba shop, because they are academic courses that have lecture and lab components (and therefore, include both tuition and field trip fees). ALL scuba classes include field trips, including anything from local Texas lakes to California, Florida, or Mexico! If you are a student in the DIVE minor, your DIVE classes counting toward the minor may be covered by financial aid.

What are the classes like?

Classes are taught by professional, experienced faculty and provide hands-on, high-impact dive training in open water and in the pool.

What is the Minor in Dive Technology and Methods all about?

Requirements:

- Complete 16 hours total (see training progression on the back)
- Minimum of 8 hours at the 300-400 level
- Must complete a medical statement or have recreational scuba divers physician examination
- Must maintain a GPA of 2.5
- Must maintain good health and fitness appropriate to the level of diving required

Can I count certifications I got at a dive shop for academic credit?

No, but certifications that you got at a dive shop can count as a prerequisite that allows you to accelerate your training.

Can I take classes out of order?

Sometimes! In the event of a direct prerequisite, you must take the prerequisite first (or provide evidence of equivalency).

What extracurricular dive activities are there?

TAMUG DIVE also supports the TAMUG dive club and a Hullabaloo U Course! You do NOT need to have taken a dive class (or even be a diver!) to participate in DIVE club, but you will need to show proof of certification to be allowed to dive.
